Report 4. Yarnfield Spring Clean

- 4.1. The Great British Spring Clean campaign 2021 was launched this week by Keep Britain Tidy. From 28th May to 13th June 2021, LitterHeroes across the country are encouraged to get outside and get active, while helping Keep Britain Tidy.
- 4.2. To help with this, Keep Britain Tidy has developed a handy pack of assets and resources to help engage communities in the campaign. 

Report 6. <u>Phone box consultation</u>

- 6.1. An invitation has been received from Stafford BC to consider a request by BT to remove the phone box in Yarnfield.
- 6.2. For some people, who do not have any kind of phone of their own, phone boxes are a lifeline. For others, they are useful if they find that their mobile phone isn't working
- 6.3. A removal of phone boxes guide has been produced by Ofcom.

6.4. Unlike a normal business, BT can't just take away services for reasons linked to money. They have a duty, known as the Universal Service Obligation, to provide a reasonable number of working phone boxes where they're most needed.

Role of the Local Organisation – Stafford Borough Council

- 6.5. When BT announces plans to remove a phone box, it is the local organisation's job to decide whether to use its local veto to object. To do this, they must first ask the views of the local community by carrying out a consultation process.
- 6.6. Comments must be returned to Stafford Borough Council by Friday 30 May
- 6.7. Things to take into account:

- i. Is the phone box provided in an area surrounded by social and privately rented houses?
- ii. Where is the next nearest phone box?
- iii. What are the takings from the phone box?
- 6.8. To exercise their power of veto the Borough Council will need to receive evidence as to the ongoing need for retention of the phone box

Recommendation.

- (a) Undertake consultation with the community over the continued need for the phone.
- (b) Delegate authority to the Clerk to respond following consultation with councillors,

Report 8. <u>National Call for evidence</u>

- 8.1. The Government has issued a call for evidence seeking views on the use of the current arrangements which have provided express provision for local authorities to hold meetings remotely or in a hybrid format during the coronavirus pandemic.
- 8.2. The call for evidence seeks to learn about the experience of local authorities in the whole of the UK regarding remote meetings.

Draft Response

- 8.3. Yarnfield and Cold Meece Parish Council quickly adapted to the new ways of working and held their first virtual meeting in May 2020. The Council also took the important decision to stream the meeting to the Parish Council's Facebook page. This obviously required some retrospective changes to the Council's standing orders and was undertaken by all with some trepidation. While there have been a few problems along the way everyone involved agrees the new arrangements have been a great success. We obviously look forward to the day when we can all come together again and hold face to face meetings as this is the natural way of working for local councils.
- 8.4. A traditional meeting held in the village hall would normally attract a small audience of up to 8; usually the same people would attend, and the age range was definitely towards the more senior members of the community. It is clear the move to on-line meetings has been to the detriment of some who don't have the facilities to use social media to watch meetings.
- 8.5. However, the return to normality will come at a price. Virtual meetings have brought with them a whole new audience who are engaged with the issues and debates affecting the parish and have a real interest in the work of the council. We regularly see 30+ people watching a meeting and commenting on the issues being discussed. The

- other important factor is that the new audience is far more fluid and represents a much broader demographic.
- 8.6. Having started on this novel approach to meetings the Parish Council is sure residents will expect it to continue, and some form of hybrid meeting will need to be developed. To do this will require technical support to develop the platform needed to stream meetings to the internet; the existing arrangement for a virtual meeting, using councillors' own computers and broadband, is simple in comparison to what will be needed for a hybrid meeting.
- 8.7. The virtual council meeting has a real place in the future of local democracy and their loss would be seen by this Council, and the community we represent, as a retrograde step.



Average over 9 months = 50,849


TOTAL Traffic Count From Cold Meece

Increase in V85 from 25 to 26mph






Y&CM PC ElanCity Radar – Speed outgoing

COUNT of Traffic V's Time (Total)







Y&CM PC ElanCity Radar – Speed over 31mph V Time

COUNT of Speed above 31mph V's Time (SUM Total)






Y&CM PC ElanCity Radar – Speed over 31mph V Day
